

## EXPERIENCE: JESUS AND THE WOMEN

Matthew 28:1-10

Luke 24:1-12

John 20:11-18

### Awareness

Before listening, reflect:

- What does it mean to cultivate faith?
- Is experience important for gaining knowledge? Is experience important for understanding? Why or why not?

So often we learn and grow the most through our experiences. Experience both solidifies truths we know and reveals gaps in our knowledge. Thankfully, we do not need to experience everything personally to learn something. We can benefit from the experience of others. This is also true for our faith. As we read the gospel accounts of Jesus' appearance to the women at the tomb that first Easter, we encounter timeless truths that can strengthen and nurture our faith today.

### Reflection

After listening, consider:

- In segment 1, hosts Scott Hoezee and Darrell Delaney talk about the instruction to “go to Galilee” and note that it is a scriptural encouragement to return to the beginning. When has your faith been nurtured by going back to the basics, returning to the beginning, or rereading something you already know?
- In segment 2, Darrell says, “Remembering is a wonderful and powerful tool that God has been using all throughout Scripture to help us reflect on what he has done and who his character is.” As you’ve remembered the stories of Jesus’ encounters with the women at the empty tomb, what is the Holy Spirit revealing to you? What did you learn or remember about God’s ways, his character, or his acts? In what way does this remembrance cultivate faith?
- In segment 3, Scott and Darrell note the humility with which Christ returns, observing how he presents himself in the ordinary and Mary mistakes him for the gardener. Can you think of an example of when you or someone you know missed recognizing Jesus' presence in an encounter or particular moment? Why do you think that happened?
- Through these stories, we’ve witnessed that God is with us in our highs and lows, when we’re crying, when we doubt, in the ordinary, and in the extraordinary. How does this encourage you in your life right now? How does this truth contribute to the development of your faith?

## Conclusion

In segment 3, Darrell and Scott note 4 observations for what the post-resurrection appearances of Jesus (from [Matthew 28:1-10](#), [Luke 24:1-12](#), and [John 20:11-18](#)) teach us yet today:

1. The gospels don't give you what they don't have. They don't sensationalize the resurrection message.
2. The resurrection accounts are all pretty ordinary, humble, and lowkey, a lot of people might have missed it.
3. The resurrection is hopeful because it fits our ordinary days too.
4. Jesus understands the highs and lows of life, the repetitive parts of life, and the temptations of life because he has been there with us—he is Immanuel, God with us.

Which of these observations do you need to remember most in order to cultivate your faith right now?

Close your time of reflection in prayer; give thanks for gospel accounts that teach us about Jesus and the Holy Spirit who nurtures our faith. Ask God to continue to nourish and grow your faith as you reread and remember the truths we find about him in the Bible.

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
