

HOW TO LIVE IN CHRIST

Galatians 5-6

Awareness

Before listening, reflect:

- If our actions and behavior do not matter for our salvation, do they matter at all? Why or why not?
- How would you explain what it means to be transformed?

As Paul concluded his letter to the Galatians, he continued to make it very clear that salvation cannot be earned, it is a gift of grace. But he also anticipated the inevitable question: do our actions and behavior even matter? By studying Galatians 5-6, we can glean wisdom for our own faith. Join us in learning from Paul's teaching on the importance of freedom with limits and what a life in step with the Holy Spirit looks like.

Listen: How to Live in Christ

Reflection

After listening, consider:

- Hosts Scott Hoezee and Darrell Delaney rely on Romans 6:1-14 and Romans 7:7-25 to help us understand Paul's teaching in Galatians 5:13-18. Reread those passages from Romans and reflect on your own journey of faith. How have you been transformed? In what areas of life can you recognize growing Christlikeness? Where in your life do you see a distinct old way of being vs. new way of behind?
- Reread Galatians 5:13-26. What does it mean to you that God does not expect any of us to accomplish
 any of this on our own, but sends the Holy Spirit to guide us and make it possible for us to bear fruit?
 How do we follow Paul's command to "keep in step with the Spirit" (v. 25)?
- In segment 3, Darrell says "My prayer is that we would allow God to use us as instruments of righteousness, that we would sow the seeds, and not because we think we are going to get something back." When have you witnessed someone being an instrument of God's righteousness simply because they were in step with the Spirit and bearing the fruit of the Spirit?

What meaningful tradition can you begin as a way to mark your baptism each year? If you know the date of your baptism, mark it on your calendar as an annual reminder. If you have not yet been baptized, think about taking this next step on your faith journey. Pray about it and discuss the meaning and significance of baptism with a pastor or trusted spiritual mentor.

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
