

The Widow's Offering

When the widow brings her small offering and places it in the Temple offering box, Jesus teaches his disciples about generosity, sacrifice, and the heart of giving. But is there more to his teaching? As we refocus our hearts on Jesus Christ during the season of Lent, see why Jesus' response during Holy Week also renews God's call for us to be people filled with love that share his heart for justice and mercy.

AWARENESS Before listening reflect on what you already know or understand about topics we'll cover in the episode.

- Have you ever gone through the motions when doing a task or participating in an event even though your heart wasn't in it? What was the effect on the final outcome?
- Which do you find easier to do: give something to God (i.e. money, time, worship) or offer someone else mercy? Why?

READ [Mark 12:41-44](#)

REFLECTION After listening, consider the following questions:

- Both the Greatest Commandment ([Mark 12:28-34](#)) and the Widow's Offering ([Mark 12: 41-44](#)) describe what God desires from us: a loving heart filled with justice and mercy. Without these, our other gifts and sacrifices to God are empty actions. Why do you think it can be more difficult for us to live into the kingdom values that lead us to love and look out for others than those that call us to follow rules about worship, giving, and sacrifices?
- Read [Mark 12:38-40](#). Towards the end of the passage, Jesus accuses the religious leaders of false holiness. Similarly, at the end of segment 2, host Scott Hoezee observes, "*There is something wrong with the Temple here. You are using it as a cover for your sinfulness instead of the place to get yourself right with God.*" What practices or actions today might we falsely believe indicate someone's holiness? What religious practices or symbols today might take the place of the temple, but serve the same purpose for us today?
- How does Jesus' teaching on giving, which highlights generosity and focuses on motivation, help you assess your current giving practices? Evaluate your giving of money (tithing), talents, and time.

- Arthur A. Just Jr., in his commentary on Luke from the Concordia Commentary series, writes this about Luke’s version of the Widow’s Offering ([Luke 18:9-14](#)) : “Perhaps Jesus is both lamenting the greedy coercion of the scribes, *while at the same time* commending the widow’s unselfish devotion to the work that goes on in God’s holy temple. She is exactly what Jesus called his disciples to be: completely devoted to the work of the Lord, even if the unscrupulous scribes demand excessive sacrifice. Jesus’ call to discipleship has never been “practical” (see, e.g., 18:22). In fact, “in its ‘impracticality’ regarding the woman’s ongoing life, it has the mark of Jesus and his radical teaching about it” (p. 781). Do you agree with his observation about Jesus’ call to discipleship? What other examples from scripture support this understanding of the story in the context of discipleship?
