A Grim Reality and a Reason to Hope

The book of Judges contains some pretty gruesome stories—stories of rebellion, rape, assassination, and murder that might leave us questioning if they belong in the Bible. Though appalling, these stories depict what happens when we turn away from God and they display our desperate need for God and his salvation plan. Judges paints a bleak and selfish picture of humanity but also teaches important lessons about leadership and about a God who won't give up on his people and whose plans give us a reason to hope.

AWARENESS Before listening reflect on what you already know or understand about topics we'll cover in the episode.

- Why do you think the Holy Spirit included the stories of Israel's judges in the Bible? What do you think is the purpose of the book of Judges?
- Have you ever made a project more difficult than it needed to be? Why? What was the outcome?



LISTEN TO THE EPISODE: A Grim Reality and a Reason to Hope

READ Judges 3:20-23, Judges 21

REFLECTION After listening, consider the following questions:

- Read <u>Isaiah 29:13</u>, <u>Titus 1:16</u>, and <u>Revelation 3:15-16</u>. How do these verses resonate with host Dave Bast's observation that Israel made it harder for themselves to maintain faith and follow God by *not* rooting out all other religions as God had commanded? What dangers might we (or do we) encounter when we do not entirely root out temptation in our midst?
- Consider Timothy Keller's observation, "All through the book of Judges, and nowhere more so than at its end, Israel's worst enemy was Israel. So often, sadly, the same is true of God's people today...We find it very easy to blame others for the weakness of the church...We wonder why God does not give unity, or send revival. We look everywhere but at ourselves" (*Judges for You*, 194-195). Do you think this is true? If so, where have you seen evidence of this? If not, why not?
- In segment 2, Dave and host Scott Hoezee discuss the end of Judges. They note how God stops speaking and seems to withdraw from the Israelites. And yet, they adamantly affirm that God is still at work. In what way is he still working behind the scenes? How do we know? Why is this knowledge important for you and how does it benefit your faith?
- As an Old Testament book, Judges never specifically talks about Jesus, and yet it vividly depicts our great need for deliverance and points us forward to him. How has studying Judges impacted your understanding of the salvation story?
