A New Family

With agonizing breath, Jesus speaks to a disciple and his mother standing at the foot of his cross. His words reveal a deep compassion for his mother, even while he endures the anguish of the cross. During Lent, discover what Jesus' great concern for his family shows us about his humanity and uncover the profound theological implications that arise from this earthly concern.

AWARENESS Before listening reflect on what you already know or understand about topics we'll cover in the episode.

- What does "family of God" or "brother/sister in Christ" mean to you? How do you define these relationships? What responsibility do we have for each other in the family of God?
- How does your experience with your biological family affect your view of the family of God?



LISTEN TO THE EPISODE: A New Family

READ John 19:23-27

REFLECTION After listening, consider the following questions:

- Even on the cross, a time of great suffering and spiritual magnitude, Jesus took note and cared for earthly concerns. What might Jesus' care and concern teach us about how we care for our own faith and how we care for and minister to others?
- In segment 2, host Scott Hoezee paraphrases Bible commentator Frederick Dale Bruner noting that when Jesus says "Woman, here is your son," and to the disciple, "Here is your mother," he honors his mother and thus fulfills Old Testament law, but also creates "a new nuclear family based on faith; a new family of God where water is thicker than blood..." What do you think this means for you and your relationship with fellow believers?
- In *Thank God It's Friday*, William Willimon echoes Bruner's understanding but goes further to describe the implications, "We, who once cared only for those folk who have the same genetic endowment as us, now are made to care for those with whom we have nothing in common except Jesus" (p. 50, Books). Do you think this is easy or difficult for most Christians to care for others this way? Why? What might we need to do or practice in an effort to make our bond in Christ stronger than our familial bonds, particularly when we do not share other traits, interests, or values in common?
- Think about Jesus Christ's earthly ministry. What stories or teachings can you identify that demonstrate the compassion for the vulnerable and the understanding of God's family that is communicated in this word from the cross?
- As host Dave Bast closes the episode, he reminds us that at its heart, this word Christ utters from the cross speaks to God's great love for us: "God sees us, God knows us, he reaches out to us in love." What does that mean to you? Who do you know that needs to hear this reminder of God's great love and care?

CONCLUSION

Think about your relationships with Christians who you do not know well, who you do not like, or who make you uncomfortable. Then read and reflect on <u>Colossians 3:12-17</u>; make note of the thoughts and feelings the Holy Spirit stirs in you as you read. Finally, prayerfully consider these words from Willimon:

"Look around you just now, at these losers who gather at the foot of the cross, people whom you hardly know, much less have much in common with. Pray to God for the grace to be able to see these strangers as your siblings. Pray to God that they'll be given the grace to see you as a close relative" (from "The Third Word" in *Thank God It's Friday*, p. 51, Books).

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
