

God Remembers Our Work

Most of us encounter some frustration or dissatisfaction with our work, whether our work is paid or unpaid. It may be one aspect we don't enjoy or it may be that the entire job feels meaningless. Studying passages in Ecclesiastes and Psalms reveals how our faith in God can give us new perspective on our work - even if our circumstances and situations do not change - helping us find eternal value and purpose in all our earthly tasks.

AWARENESS Before listening reflect on what you already know or understand about topics we'll cover in the episode.

- In what ways has the reality of a fallen creation affected the work you do? What frustrations, tedium, purposelessness, etc do you experience in your work and how might they be the result of a sin-sick creation?
- How would you describe the purpose of work? What do you do to motivate yourself when there is a task you do not want to do or when you simply do not want to work?

REFLECTION After listening, consider the following questions:

- In segment 1, hosts Scott Hoezee and Dave Bast discuss some of the more grievous ways sin has corrupted work. How does your faith in Jesus Christ affect you as a consumer? What are some ways you can improve your awareness or change your purchasing habits to become a more responsible consumer? It can be overwhelming and intimidating to be an individual consumer in a world filled with corrupt, broken industries - after brainstorming ways you can become a more responsible consumer, which one or two changes seem most manageable to incorporate into your life right now?
- How have your feelings toward your work affected your faith? What positive and negative impacts have your work experiences had on your faith?
- Consider the conversation in segment 2 on [Ecclesiastes 3](#). When you consider God's perspective on work, how does your perspective on work change? When you consider the eternal perspective or lasting impact, what changes?
- How might your work contribute to God's larger plan or purpose in the world? What could the eternal consequences of your work be? What are some changes you can make so that your faith can begin impacting your work as opposed to your work affecting your faith?
