

# Jesus' Parables, Discipleship, and the Cost of Following Jesus

Jesus often taught in parables, simple stories that illustrated a spiritual truth. Some of Jesus' most famous parables are unique to the Gospel of Luke. In what we call the Parable of the Good Samaritan, Jesus describes for his followers who would be their neighbor and what it means to be a good neighbor. Telling the Parable of the Pharisee and Tax Collector, he focuses on the condition of the heart and salvation by grace. Jesus' parables highlight a major theme in Luke: our call to discipleship. Throughout the book, we repeatedly find the invitation to follow Jesus Christ. Together, let's discover what Jesus teaches about the attitudes and hearts of his followers and discuss honestly what it costs to prioritize Jesus in our lives.

**REFLECTION** After listening, consider the following questions:

- Reflecting on Jesus' parable of the good Samaritan in [Luke 10:25-37](#), host Darrell Delaney said the law expert who asked Jesus, "Who is my neighbor?" was trying to find a "loophole" to justify not loving one's neighbor as oneself. Do you think Christians today are guilty of this, too? What about you? Has the Holy Spirit ever convicted you of trying to find a loophole for obeying God and following Jesus?
- Are there social or cultural boundaries you find especially challenging to cross?
- As Darrell and host Scott Hoezee closed their study of Jesus' Parable of the Pharisee and Tax Collector in [Luke 18:9-14](#), they pointed out the danger of the Pharisee's self-righteousness. Scott said, "It is not just other people who need grace...we all need grace...We need to remember that grace is just as much for us as for anybody else." When do you think we are most susceptible to forgetting our reliance upon God's grace, like the Pharisee? What can we do to guard against this?
- As he discussed what the disciples had to leave behind to follow Jesus, Darrell said, "Discipleship is not about adding another thing to your life. You have to actually re-prioritize your life if you are going to follow Jesus." How is this consistent or inconsistent with what you've been taught about discipleship? Is this re-prioritizing a one-time occurrence, or will you need to do it multiple times during your faith journey? Why?
