# Jonah: Doing God's Work

God has work for each of us to do. It doesn't matter who we are, what we've done, or how inadequate we feel, God has a message of relentless love and abundant mercy for us to share with people who need to hear it. As we continue studying the book of Jonah, we're reminded that our God is a God of second chances—both for us and for others. Whether we like it or not, God is eager to spread his compassion and mercy through us. Together, let's grow deeper in our understanding of how much God cares even about people who don't know—and maybe even don't care—about him, and let's discover the courage to never give up on someone or let our bias hinder our commitment to follow God's call in the world today.

**AWARENESS** Before listening reflect on what you already know or understand about topics we'll cover in the episode.

- What does it mean to repent?
- In your opinion, what makes it difficult for you to tell others about God and the good news of salvation?

## **READ** Jonah 3

#### **REFLECTION** After listening, consider the following questions:

- Can you identify any other examples of people who were "crooked sticks" that God used to make a positive impact for his kingdom or to bring others to him? Consider examples from the Bible, from history, and from your life. Why do you consider these people "crooked sticks"? How did God use them to witness?
- Have you ever seen God work despite a person's attitude or active resistance or can you think of any other biblical examples of this? What does it teach you about God's character?
- In segment 3, host Darrell Delaney refers to God's "lovingkindness." This is a reference to the Hebrew word *hesed*, a word whose meaning is complex and not concisely translated into English. It is commonly translated as "loving kindness," "steadfast love," "unfailing love," or more simply as "love," "kindness," "mercy," or "loyalty." *Hesed* is found in passages like <a href="Exodus 34:6-7">Exodus 34:6-7</a>, <a href="Psalm 36:5-10">Psalm 86</a>, <a href="Psalm 136">Psalm 136</a>, <a href="Isaiah 54:7-8">Isaiah 54:7-8</a>, and so many, many more. According to <a href="Strong's Exhaustive Concordance">Strong's Exhaustive Concordance</a> the word <a href="hesed">hesed</a> appears 251 times in 241 verses of the Old Testament. Read 2-3 of the above passages that talk about God's <a href="hesed">hesed</a>. What do these verses help you better understand about God's character? What do these verses reveal to you about the breadth of God's love for Jonah, for the Ninevites, for you, or for those you consider evil and sinful in today's world?
- Toward the end of segment 3, host Scott Hoezee says "What we need to do is remain open to God's surprises. He is a surprising God." Are you open to God's surprises? Why or why not? What could you do to help develop an openness to being surprised by God?

#### CONCLUSION

Scott and Darrell identify three takeaways we can apply to our lives from our study of Jonah 3:

- "Don't write yourself off. God can use you to witness."
- "Don't write other people off because God may be working in their hearts and is just waiting for you to talk to them."
- "Don't limit the love of God."

Which one of these takeaways do you think is most challenging for you? What about the church as a whole? Pray about this. Close your prayer by giving thanks for God's *hesed*, his forgiveness, and his salvation.

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
