

Stay Faithful to God, Serve the Lord

Joshua was a successful and God-fearing leader. He led the Israelites in following and obeying God, and under his leadership, they experienced God's provision and the fulfillment of his promises. We long to hear the advice of successful leaders like Joshua and learn from the secrets of their success. The book of Joshua concludes with Joshua's farewell speech to the Israelites. In it, he recalls that all his strength, all his victories, and all his successful leadership is God's doing and he urges Israel to remember it too. Join us as we study Joshua's farewell speech and discuss how we can continue to remember our promise-keeping God and all he has done for us through the work of Jesus Christ.

- Are there any "famous last words" that are meaningful to you? Whose words were they and why are they meaningful?
- Have you ever made a promise but failed to keep it? What happened? How did you feel? Were there any consequences?

READ [Joshua 23-24](#)

REFLECTION After listening, consider the following questions:

- Reflect on host Scott Hoezee's statement from segment 1, "God makes it clear that God is the one who gave them this land. Yes, they fought. They had to do stuff, of course; but it was ultimately God...so, now Joshua says: so don't turn around and slap God in the face. You are living in the land of grace." What does Scott mean by "don't turn around and slap God in the face"? In what ways might we be tempted to act in ways that "slap God in the face" today?
- Reread Joshua 23:14-16. In segment 2, Scott reminds us that "The good news for us as Christians is that we now know that we don't live under that threat because Jesus took it all for us." If the punishments Joshua warned about have been born by Jesus, why is it still valuable for us to study and heed Joshua's warning?
- At the end of segment 2, Scott and host Darrell Delaney discuss the theological saying "the already and the not yet," the reality that God's kingdom has already come, but it has not yet fully come. Where do you see this concept of living in God's "already and not yet" reality reflected?
- As host Darrell Delaney reflects on the Israelites' inability to keep their commitment to be faithful to God, he says, "If you read the Bible, you know that no one can fully fulfill and perfectly keep God's law and commandments." What other Bible verses or stories can you recall that support this truth?
