

Your Questions about Christmas

Did the Christmas story really happen? Wasn't Christmas originally a pagan holiday? Why do some churches celebrate Advent? Join *Groundwork* as we dig into Scripture to answer commonly asked questions about Christmas and Advent.

REFLECTION After listening, consider the following questions:

- In segment 1, hosts Scott Hoezee and Darrell Delaney discuss reasons why we believe the Christmas story is true: 1) because we believe the Holy Spirit inspired Luke to research and write it, 2) the specific names of Roman leaders are verifiable in other non-biblical historical sources, and 3) it's unlikeliness gives it credibility. Which of these reasons resonates with you most?
- In segment 2, Darrell and Scott discuss the origins of celebrating Christ's birth on December 25, noting that there was the pagan celebration of Saturnalia and Winter Solstice when they would celebrate light and honor Caesar. The early Christians chose to celebrate the birth of Jesus and honor the real light of the world instead. How do Christians still use aspects of culture to honor God and share Jesus with the world?
- Have you ever considered observing Advent as a spiritual discipline? Do you think that's an accurate description? Why or why not?
